





Methodology of Intervention

1. Community participation in all stages of the project:

Design

- Application letter
- Water source evaluation process
- Coordination with local entities

Implementation

- Financial contribution (right to service, tools, logistics costs)
- Labor input

Ongoing

- System remains the property of the community and responsibility of the Water Committee
- Monthly service fee





Key to success of long-term projects

2. Presence of the APLVN team in the community throughout the project

ETAP: a school to train local technicians in the four areas of expertise and accomplishment.

Technical Abilities

- ✓ Expertise in gravity-fed water systems, self-regulated by the friction in the pipes.
- ✓ Creation of a **Technical School**
- ✓ Development of three advanced programs






Air in Pipes

Funded by Rotary Club: 25,838 U\$







Communities in Wiwilí Nueva Segovia

New Access to Water and Sanitation Project

- 4 communities: Caño de los Bravos 1, Caño de los Bravos 2, San Jacinto, Canta Gallo
- Municipality of Wiwilí, Nueva Segovia
- 252 familias, 3 primary schools, 5 churches, 1 health center = 928 people

■ 261 home connections, almost 30 km of pipes, 85 latrines

Total budget: **U\$ 416,159**

Community participation: U\$ 115,701

To be funded: U\$ 300,458

Las Barandas

New Access to Water and Sanitation Project

- Community of Las Barandas
- Municipality of Siuna, Autonomous Region of North Caribbean Cost of Nicaragua
- 68 familias, 3 primary schools, 2 churches, 1 health center = **310** people

■ 73 home connections, around 20 km of pipes, 76 latrines

Total budget: **U\$ 216,831**

Community participation: U\$ 62,995

To be funded: U\$ 148,170

In negotiation with City Hall for co-funding





Villa Siquia

Rehabilitation and Extension Water and Sanitation Project

- Community of Villa Siquia
- Municipality of Paiwas, Autonomous Region of South Caribbean Cost of Nicaragua
- Former project built by APLV in 2003, including 52 home connections
- 76 familias, 1 primary school, 3 churches, 1 health center, 1 community center = 349 people
- 82 home connections, around 12 km of pipes, 51 latrines

Total budget: **U\$ 137,006**

Community participation: U\$ 29,625

To be funded: U\$ 107,381

In negotiation with City Hall for co-funding
